
Before the beginning...

Cataclysm is one of the "powers" of the Universe; that is, the Universe destroys some of its achievements as a necessary condition for new creativity.

The explosive death of our Supernova gave birth to our Solar System. The food crisis of the first life forms precipitated the invention of photosynthesis. The deadly build up of oxygen—the waste product of photosynthesis—brought a new collaboration between "breathers" and "non-breathers" to form nucleated cells. This breakthrough led to ever more complex and diverse life forms inventing shells, brains, backbones, fins, lungs...

Cataclysm uplifted tectonic plates and volcanic eruptions sent rock and lava bursting forth from Earth's fiery core and land began to push up from the ocean floor. Soon plants and animals, as they began to move ashore, evolved new forms and structures: woody cells, legs, wings, arms...

Just 65 million years ago the impact of a giant asteroid ended the long reign of the dinosaurs. In their absence new and radically amazing life forms were able to unfold the bountiful and gorgeous web of life that we enjoy today.




The Rise of Civilization
