■ READING

Brothers will be inspired by and embody the new story of the Universe, a new understanding of Jesus and the example of Edmund Rice.

OWITF, Proposition, Art. 3

The New Universe Story is the story of evolution of the entire universe starting some 13.7 billion years ago. This story suggests that all life, including human life, comes from the same source.

So all creation is part of a single community of life and is interconnected in profound ways. Within that community, humans have evolved a unique consciousness which enables them to respond to the needs of the whole of creation. For Christians, this action is the Spirit of God working from within creation and bringing about ever more complex life.

The Universe Story allows a glimpse of the evolutionary process of which every one is a part. It opens up the possibility of a new consciousness about what it means to be human within a cosmic community. Thomas Berry describes this as the "Great Work" for humanity and a particular vocation for Religious Sisters and Brothers.



■ READING

REVELATION IS ON-GOING. God speaks as loudly to-day through the wonders of creation as God ever spoke in the past. To deny the on-going nature of revelation is to deny in some way the story

of the Universe and the way in which the Divine Presence continues to manifest in it and through it.

Revelation arises out of an experience of the Divine. If there is no experience of the Divine, there can be no revelation. Revelation like prophesy is on going. It is a denial of the fundamental belief that God is revealed in and through creation to suggest that revelation ceased two thousand years ago, and that all we have been doing ever since is living off of past experiences of God. As Gabriel Moran has succinctly put it:

"A prophet does not tell people revelations; instead he awakens the revelatory character of their own lives. Revelation is not what prophets have, it is what communities experience. Far from being isolated from community, the prophet is the one most deeply in touch with the roots of the community's life. Like the artist he will not conveniently fit into the ordinary framework of the community. He will be strongly opposed by part of the community. This is the test of true prophets who persist in trying to awaken the whole community to its undreamt of possibilities. The only final test of the prophet is whether he does eventually succeed, that is, whether his words and actions resonate in the experience of humankind."

More to be desired are they than gold, more than the purest gold, and sweeter are they than honey, than drippings from the comb. ■ SCRIPTURE Jn 15, 26



READING

I have read quite a bit about the Universe Story, and it challenges my understandings of our traditional expressions of Catholic faith – new consciousness of creation itself, questions around Original Sin and Redemption, Jesus as 'Saviour', being some of them. At the moment, there appears a hesitation on the part of the hierarchical Church to look more deeply at these issues. It seems to be often the case that many in the Church are living new realities before they are finally recognized by the hierarchy. A faithfulness to the exploration, to genuine study and conversation and to a reverent listening to views all seem to be part of what I need to do.

Jesus, as a human person, grew in relationship to the Mystery we call God in his time. Everything around him led him to a deeper awareness of that Mystery whom he related to as Father. I want to learn from Jesus about his growth in the Mystery, and to grow more deeply in that relationship. I find I relate much more to the human Jesus, rather than put more energy into worshipping a divine Jesus. At a time when there are so many parts

of the world where basic human rights are violated, the humanity of Jesus with his challenges to systems of power, his healing and compassion, and his attention to the poorest, is the essence of how we have to relate to one another.

That said, I think that the image of the 'Cosmic Christ' is crucial for us too, and it will be important for us to keep studying and dialoguing to understand this cosmic dimension. I think that we can easily by-pass the hard study and reflection that the Universe Story is requiring of us, because it is not simple, and yet new insights are emerging into seeing Christ as part of the bigger story which are exciting and a better expression of traditional belief for these days. It's an on-going exploration that we have to be part of with some energy.

■ READING

One of the Key goals of the 2008 Congregation Chapter was to sensitize the brothers to issues around the environment, the universe story, a larger view of the world around us and our place in it and a consequent different view of God in relation to this

universe. This is a huge agenda and it is no surprise that it is an on-going one. In many ways it is an attempt to shift the spiritual view of the brothers from a very intellectual view of God and the universe to a more mystical vision. The central mystical vision within and beyond Christianity has always been that all is one and that all leads to God. The more we learn about the universe around us, the more this vision becomes clear.

St. Francis of Assisi is often referred to as the patron saint of ecology and not without reason. While many might say his spiritual insight and charism centred on poverty, this is not accurate.

Francis had a passion for evangelical poverty but only as a means. He saw a world tied down by material things and in need of freedom. Poverty was the means he saw to attain this freedom. By being freed from material bondage, people were now open to see God where God dwelled, i.e. everywhere. Francis was able to see God in nature where it is easy and in lepers where it is hard.

Francis was so conscious of the all-present God that he identified as personally as he could with God, which is one explanation for the phenomenon of the stigmata. Francis did not only see God but was trying to identify with God and express his love for God as much as he could. It was during a vision of the crucified Jesus within the six-winged fiery seraph that Francis received the wounds.

Relationship with the Earth community has its greatest meaning when it is rooted in a quest for the mystical vision of the Creator of that universe. The Earth awareness movement as a foundational principle of Our Way into the Future, like all such principles, must lead us to God.'

we ourselves, who have the first fruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for our adoption, the redemption of our bodies.



■ READING

THE WORLD AS WE KNOW IT is slipping away. At the current rate of destruction, tropical rainforests could be gone within as little as forty years. The seas are being overfished to the point of exhaustion, and coral reefs are dying from ocean acidification. Biologists

say that we are currently at the start of the largest mass extinction event since the disappearance of the dinosaurs. As greenhouse gases increasingly accumulate in the atmosphere, temperatures are likely to rise faster than our current ecological and agricultural systems can adapt.

It is no secret that the Earth is in trouble and that we humans are to blame. Just knowing these grim facts, however, won't get us very far. We have to transform this knowledge into a deep passion to change course. But passion does not come primarily from the head; it is a product of the heart. And the heart is not aroused by the bare facts alone. It needs stories that weave those facts into a moving and meaningful narrative.

We need a powerful new story that we are a part of nature and not separate from it. We need a story that properly situates humans in the world—neither above it by virtue of our superior intellect, nor dwarfed by the universe into cosmic insignificance. We are equal partners with all that exists, co-creators with trees and galaxies and the microorganisms in our own gut, in a materially and spiritually evolving universe.

This was the breathtaking vision of the late Father Thomas Berry. Berry taught that humanity is presently at a critical decision point. Either we develop a more heart-full relationship with the Earth that sustains us, or we destroy ourselves and life on the planet.
